## Enculturation of the Young in a Political and Social Democracy

As the foundation of American public schools, democracy is critical to an educated citizenry. The importance of understanding educating for a democracy applies to all educators at every level.

If our nation is to repossess its civic soul, it needs to recapture the central civic responsibilities of public schools -- indeed of schooling in general... This means that if American schools are to be defined by the search for literacy, then civic literacy must take its place alongside science, math, English and cultural literacy... Lawyers and doctors are no more likely to make good citizens than dropouts if their training is limited to the narrow and self-interested world defined by vocational preparation and professional instruction. Youngsters preparing to turn their schooling to the purposes of economic competition with Japan and Germany must also be able to turn their schooling to the purposes of civic cooperation with their fellow Americans in making democracy work.
